GENERAL INFORMATION

Cambridge is across the Charles River from Boston; the three miles between the city centers can be traversed by subway or taxi. By subway, from Logan Airport or from North Station, change at Park Street for Harvard Square; from South Station, direct to Harvard Square.

The Massachusetts Turnpike ends at the circumferential highway 128. From it, the most convenient ways into Cambridge are state routes 2 and 16.

Maps of Cambridge will be available at registration April 5.

Members should reserve accommodations for themselves. The committee on local arrangements recommends the Cambridge House Motel, 1637 Massachusetts Avenue (telephone 491-1000), four blocks from Harvard Square. Rates: \$12 for a single room, \$16 for a double. In requesting reservations, mention attendance at the conference. Other hotels which may have space available are: in Cambridge, the Hotel Continental, 29 Garden Street, and the Treadway Motel, 110 Mount Auburn Street; in Boston, the Parker House, 60 School Street, two blocks from the Park Street subway station.

The following restaurants generally prefer reservations to be made for dinner but not for luncheon. Most serve luncheon at \$1 to \$3 and, except as noted, serve wine but not cocktails.
